

Victorian Election 2022

Methodology

The following tables and graphs are based on a sample which has been selected for voting intention based on the results of the last Newspoll.

Results should be taken as indicative in that the sample is not properly randomised, but it is unlikely the group is completely unrepresentative.

In these tables we have amalgamated the Democratic Labor Party, Family First, Liberal Democrats, One Nation, and the United Australia Party as one and labelled them "Nationalist". This is so that we have a statistically significant sample for this group, and because these parties in our sample attract similar voters, with significantly more having voted Liberal or Liberal National previously than have voted Labor. We have amalgamated the Reason, Victorian Socialists, Sustainable Australia Party and the Teals as "Others" for similar reasons.

The poll was conducted from October 31, 2022 through to November 13, 2022 using our online panel of over 6,000 Australian voters.

Quantitative analysis was undertaken using Microsoft Excel. Qualitative analysis was undertaken using Leximancer.

Executive Summary

In 2018 Andrews started close to level with Guy on personal approval and pollsters predicted a close race. By the end of the campaign the ALP scored 57.3% of the two-party vote, and while Andrews' approval had increased, Guy's had collapsed, most dramatically amongst Liberal voters. This was a landslide of historic proportions.

That's pretty much where Andrews and Guy started this election, although quantitative polling since the election was called shows the margin between the two parties <u>narrowing to somewhere around</u> 53% ALP on a two-party preferred basis – not historic, but substantial.

In 2018 at the start of the election voters were evenly divided as to whether the state was heading in the right direction. By the end a net 28% thought it was. At the start of this election voters again were evenly divided on this question.

The premier's approval has also come back to par with just as many approving of him as disapprove (47%/46%) and very few yet to make up their minds, unlike Matthew Guy, who starts more or less where he ended the last election with 64% of respondents disapproving, including 26% of Liberal voters.

Andrews is also preferred as premier by 56% to 42% and voters say his government deserves to be re-elected by 52% to 41%. By contrast a net -48% thinks the opposition deserves to win (18%/66%).

The issues that will decide this election should favour the Liberals. The perennial dichotomy between climate change as the most serious issue for the left, and economics and debt as the most serious for the right, is present in the responses.

However, this election the economic issues are shared by more centre and left voters, while climate change is understood as primarily a federal issue, and one where Labor has performed well. This means the economy is more of a swing issue. Greens voters have shifted their attention to traditional environmental issues, like logging of old growth forest, so they don't necessarily give the government credit on environmental issues.

The major swing issues appear to be to do with health - particularly hospitals and ambulances – and poor management of infrastructure.

There is plenty of incentive for voters to send Andrews a message that he is "power mad" and a "bully" for a variety of reasons such as COVID lockdowns, corruption scandals, maladministration, secrecy, high-handedness, and miring the state in debt.

The expectation that he will win is extremely strong at 73%, so a lot of voters could feel they could safely direct a vote to another party, but still end up with a Labor government.

But what sort of message would they send by voting for Matthew Guy? Guy hasn't shaken the image of sleaze generated by rezonings when he was Planning Minister in the Napthine government, or when he was snapped dining on lobster at the same function as a mobster. And he has a problem cutting through and gaining attention, variously attributed to his own lack of ability, or media bias, depending on how you vote.

Since our poll Guy has also been hit by controversies around some of his candidates over their religious beliefs. Disciplining them will cause trouble for him with minority centre and right-wing

parties whose preferences he needs, and not disciplining them will play into the hands of Daniel Andrews who branded some of the minor parties "Nazis".

So the grounds are there for independents and the Greens to do well as a result of the lack of punch of the Liberal Party, and concern about Andrew's style of government.

Ironically, one thing that might limit these gains and direct votes to the Liberals is pity for them. Many voters accept the need for a strong opposition and don't feel they have it. A number of Labor voters were therefore thinking of voting for Liberal candidates who they thought had potential to redress this problem.

One of these was John Pesutto, once seen as a future Liberal leader, running in Hawthorn. This is also the seat most likely to fall to a Teal candidate, Melissa Lowe, so it will provide a testing ground of protest votes. It's possible there could be a protest against the Liberals as well as Labor.

Labor can potentially win more than 50% of the two-party preferred vote, but still win fewer than 50% of the seats. Then again, Labor's campaign came home fast in 2018, and possible Liberal gains could easily evaporate.

Significant findings

- Dead heat on whether the state is heading in the right direction. ALP very certain it is (93%) while Liberals (93%) and Nationalists (89%) disagree. However only 50% of Greens and 33% of Independents and 45% of Others agree.
- 2. Greens disagreement is mostly frustration that the government isn't doing enough about health and the environment. Independents reservations appear to be around, if not corruption, lack of accountability or democracy in government. Others is more broadly-based mentioning health, housing, education and COVID lockdowns.
- 3. The issues in general for the state are along an axis from climate change on the left to economic management (including debt) on the right. The economic issues are hotter than the environmental ones, and they are followed by health (including ambulances) and infrastructure, which are also hotter than the environment. The health issues are shared by all voters as a concern, making them possible vote changers.
- 4. When asked for issues that are important this election there are more widespread mentions of climate change, but health is still a more strongly felt issue. Management is a theme which links health to infrastructure. A less urgent theme is the need for a strong opposition. There is a recognition from a significant number of voters that climate change issues are more a federal issue.
- 5. The reasons given for first preference votes are frequently strategic. That doesn't mean voters are not thinking of issues, but it might be that recent election results have alerted them to the potential for splits in historical voting blocs giving rise to patterns that they may or may not want.
- 6. When asked about their final preference (effectively who would they like to control the parliament) issues return, but climate change is not a significant one. It is health, followed by a need to establish a check in the Legislative Council, and concern that the Liberal Party has been taken over by religious conservatives.
- 7. The ALP's first preference vote has declined with most of the decline transferring to the Greens, although a substantial proportion of Greens has also moved to Labor. The Liberals have increased with the biggest contributions being from Independents and the Nationalists.

There was some cross-movement between Liberals and Nationalists, but none between Liberals and Independents, or Greens.

- Daniel Andrews has a neutral net approval rating with 47% approval and 46% disapproval, which allowing for rounding nets out to zero. His highest approval is amongst ALP voters (94% net), and lowest with Liberal voters (-93% net). Greens are net 50% approving, and Others net 26%. Independents are net -27% and Nationalists -86%.
- 9. COVID makes its first strong appearance in judgments of the premier. It divides voters, but on balance favours his re-election and is much more likely to be used in comments about whether voters approve of his performance, rather than what makes them hesitate. Corruption is also a significant issue for Andrews, but much less frequently mentioned than COVID. The other factor is style of government and a perception that he is "power mad" and a "bully".
- 10. Despite the Premier's modest approval 52% thinks the government deserves to be reelected, while 41% disagree. This can be misleading as it incorporates very strong support from both Labor and Greens, but Independents and Nationalists are moderately disapproving. If support is bottled-up in very strong seats, weaker seats can deliver a loss against the overall level of support.
- 11. When asked to nominate specific hesitations when thinking of voting for Andrews, the Labor brand appears to be a problem and associated with high levels of debt and low levels of confidence. Then there is the perception that he is a bully.
- 12. Matthew Guy is deeply into disapproval territory with a Net -45% approval rating with only 19% approving and 64% disapproving. Most telling, his total approval amongst Coalition voters is below 50% at 48% resulting in a net 22%. He has a negative net rating of -91% with Labor voters, -100% with Greens, -82% Others, -73% Independents and -32% Nationalists.
- 13. In line with Guy's personal approval ratings a net -49% think the Opposition has done enough to deserve to be elected the government. They receive a net positive of only 19% from Coalition voters, with only 42% agreeing and 23% disagreeing. They are net negative with all of the groups they need to secure preferences from.
- 14. Approval of Guy most strongly focusses on the state of the Liberal Party and whether he can lead it effectively. There is mention of health and climate change in this context. There are some integrity issues, but they are muted compared to the premier's issues in this area. The other theme is his poor media performance which is either blamed on media bias, or his lack of charisma.
- 15. Hesitation in voting for Guy again centres around party brand, and presumed policy positions based on that. There are not a lot of concrete objections, just references to style of policies, concern about the religious right, or straight-out denigration of the Liberal Party. There are some integrity issues, with "Mobster with a Lobster" making an appearance in the comments, but these are small compared to perceptions of Andrew's integrity issues.
- 16. Andrews is preferred Premier 56% to 42%. ALP, Coalition and Greens are strong for either Andrews or Guy, depending on their orientation. Independents and Other also favour Andrews, with Nationalists being the only other grouping beside the Coalition who favour Guy.
- 17. Comments on preferred premier overwhelmingly centre on Andrews. It is either an endorsement of his ability to perform, or concern about his honesty and integrity. Guy is mostly absent from the comments with them being directed generically at the Liberal Party.
- 18. Andrews is very strongly expected to win (73%) while a hung parliament is the next most popular expectation on 17%. Only 6% expect a Coalition win (which includes only 15% of Coalition voters).

19. Only 46% wants Labor to win, while 40% wants the Coalition to win. 14% wants a hung parliament, and this is concentrated amongst Greens, Independents and Nationalists.


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Qualitative Analysis

Our qualitative analysis looks at the reasons given by respondents for their various judgements. The following maps are generated from the data by Leximancer and overlay the key words over the variables from the question – generally the answer to the question plus voting intentions. Words that are most closely associated will cluster together. The most frequently used words are brighter than those used less frequently.

We do not edit the verbatims and all spelling and grammatical errors are reproduced. Editing the transcripts would take away from some of the unique tone of each response. The verbatims are selected so as to give a better insight into how the individual words are being used.

Thinking about Victoria how strongly would you agree or disagree that the state is heading in the right direction?









Victoria needs one party in control. I no longer trust Labor and a mix of greens , teals and independents would be shambolic.



Vic. Labor have reasonable policies on Climate and public investment in infrastructure, education and health.


Couldn't bring myself to vote for this fake Liberal (aka appallingly conservative / taken over by religious nutters) party.




The ALP are not generally good to women in the party eg put them in unwinnable spots. But the FV and gender equality policies are strong

A political leader should be able to govern their own party. Due to his poor leadership there are schisms, poorly thought out policies and whiffs of corruption.


He probably has Buckley's chance of winning, and seems to be coming up with wild policies in desperation. Who would trust a Liberal to deliver on public transport or hospitals?


